*Linda Stewart* is an Assistant Professor in the English Department at KSU, where she teaches composition, world literature, and English Education courses. She has taught learning communities within the Peace Studies program and is one of the instructors for the AMST 3700 course. Her affiliation with the Kennesaw Mountain Writing Project (KMWP), where she served as a faculty co-director and as a pilot teacher coordinator for the “Keeping and Creating American Communities” project, was pivotal in developing her interests in interdisciplinary studies and collaborative projects. She contributed essays to *Writing America: Classroom Literacy and Public Engagement* and *Writing Our Communities: Local Learning and Public Culture*. With Dr. Sarah Robbins, she coauthored the essay “Seeing Community: Visual Culture in College Composition” in *Teachers’ Writing Groups: Collaborative Inquiry and Reflection for Professional Growth*. Most recently, with Laura Davis, she is coediting an essay collection about English studies and technology, where she contributed an article, “Measuring Up: The Uncertainty of Assessing New Media.” She also collaborated with Beth Daniell, Laura Davis and Ellen Taber for a forthcoming article in *Pedagogy*. Stewart has been teaching at KSU since 1998 where she was selected for the English Department’s Distinguished Teacher Award and the KSU Alumni Association’s 2006 Betty L. Siegel Teaching Award. Her conference experience includes presentations at CCCC, WPA, NCTE, GCTE, the Virginia Woolf Conference, the Watson Conference, and the American Studies Association.
